This has been a very busy term for the Trust Board focussing, as you would expect, on getting our schools through the current Covid crisis. We have been so impressed with the resilience

Appleton Roebuck Primary School

Returning after so many months away was always going to be a challenging time for everyone: pupils returning to school-based learning; teachers who had tirelessly worked throughout lockdown with key-worker children once again managing full classes; and parents, some still working at home, some back in their 'new' normal workplaces.

It is with huge pride that I look back on a term where everyone has not only taken this in their stride, but actually thrived, using creativity to turn a disrupted, somewhat bleak time into a superb opportunity to embrace a new way of learning. Recalling something someone said to me a few months ago - we had "innovated through crisis." In the face of so many challenges and changes to our normal routine – who would ever have considered a 'bubble' as a collective noun for any group of people before? – our school community has demonstrated every one of our core values of wisdom, courage, kindness, love and gratitude on a daily basis. It has been hard, but (touch wood) we have kept all of our children safe and are incredibly fortunate to have had a Covid-free school. It has taken wisdom from the staff to restructure the school in such a way that every child could still grow, having access to all the resources they need – and space to unwind – without crossing the paths of other bubbles. Building routines around extra cleaning regimes, and looking at flexible ways of managing staff absence when they have been required to self-isolate.

We have seen so much courage: for many who had been at home with few opportunities to leave the house, returning to school was filled with fear and anxiety. Can we still do this? Will we cope without our loved ones around us each day? And without a single exception, everyone has risen to the challenge. Staff have shared the highs (usually on a Google Meet!) and comforted each other (again, without physical contact) during the times when each of us has been knocked down by this bizarre world in which we are living. For our pupils, facing the challenge of catch-up, new routines, new rules and being away from home has really been a testament to their courage and resilience. Our children are smiling!

The kindness shown by our community has been humbling. Our staff have had their heads down for months, barely coming up for air as rules and approved practices changed, so it has been wonderful to receive messages of support from parents. Being nominated as 'school of the week' for BBC Radio York in November, couldn't have come at a better time. The warm words from pupils, staff and parents were shared with the whole of North Yorkshire, and really showcased our distinctive and holistic school

Being celebrated in a case study as a leading school in our approach to Mental Health and Wellbeing was just incredible. Never before have we appreciated having had this priority firmly in place, but being able to draw on this embedded work and knowing who to ask for help has been vital. Both through lockdown and during this last term, we have endeavoured to show all of our families warmth and love at a time when it would have been far easier to remain remote and disconnected. We're now communicating far better with our families and actively working in partnership to support children and their wider families. Our children have better attendance than before Covid - they are supported to feel well and finding ways to be happy. We feel that out of the difficulty has come growth and understanding. Collaboration and support of schools both locally and around the world to share this learning experience has begun.

Finally, at the end of the term, we dedicated our outdoor Christmas tree to demonstrate the myriad ways in which we can express gratitude, with children writing bauble tags to hang on the tree saying what they are grateful for. Being able to express gratitude is such an important aspect of developing positive thinkers, of helping people realise what really matters in life. With so much of our normal world being restricted, and fun activities like school trips and inter-school sports fixtures still on hold – and catch-up required from a full term without children in their normal classrooms – we have refocused our days and our curriculum to challenge, motivate and engage the children more than ever, and it has worked. I am so grateful to everyone who has contributed to this phenomenal effort within our school.

I wish our whole school family a peaceful and safe Christmas.

Brayton CE Primary School



What a jammed-packed, learning filled, happy start to the year we have had at Brayton C of E Primary School! We have seen the launch of Brayton TV, which has provided opportunities for

interactive learning, has seen children showcase their personal talents - such as sign language, Christmas baking



and musical martial arts – and has been a platform to involve our wider community with a family quiz and parent videos. We have continued to come together as a whole school

Each year group have celebrated their learning with a special topic themed day. In addition to this, our Year 5/6 children have been developing their entrepreneurial skills by running a weekly tuck shop and making bobble hats for charity. Our children continue to 'Shine As One' community.

The autumn term at Kellington Primary School, whilst different, has been very busy. We have been working hard but having lots of fun too. We started the autumn term with a whole school focus, across the




South Milford Primary School
