Appleton Roebuck Primary School ~ Visit us here

The last eighteen months has been a time of challenge for all, and particularly our children and young people. As a school, we at Appleton Roebuck have prioritised the well-being of our children and have been congratulated for the positive, respectful and nurturing relationships that are a strong foundation in our smaller-than-average primary school.

One exciting relationship that has developed over the course of this academic year has been that between our pupils and the subject of Art. Specialist Artist and teacher, Sue Wallace, joined us in September 2020, bringing with her a real sense of energy and passion. Through her excellent teaching and investment in each individual, we have seen the subject burst into life and delivery of our carefully designed curriculum has really inspired our children through Sue's knowledge, skills and nurture. We have seen our children navigate their way through uncertainty, full opening, bubble closures, lockdown, fear, loneliness and confusion, but through Art, they have found a way to use self -expression and creativity; building confidence paintings had dried, they were keen to share

Red Kites have been learning about the Abstract

Expressionist art movement. Their Jackson Pollock paintings were inspired by sensory observations, for instance, for hearing they closed their eyes and listened to the sound of the leaves being blown by the

gentle breeze and the sharp, repeated call of birds in the trees and then found ways of recording those sounds visually. After their

their work with each other and explain which marks had developed from which sensory experience.

The Foxes looked at primitive carvings and thought about why they were made. They learned that underneath all of the reasons such as honouring gods, fertility or empowering chiefs, the underlying theme of safety was strong. They then designed and created a small

A great deal of the work we have done this term has an environmental theme. This is important to us, and our children show great interest in improving the world that they see around them. Eco Warrior teams have been really busy in both schools, working towards the Eco-Schools Green Flag award. We are delighted to have attained the Bronze award at Saxton, and the Silver award at Monk Fryston. This is only the start of our journey, though, and we hope to achieve the Green Flag at both schools before 2022.

Our outside areas are really improving. We have a beautiful woodland trail through the wildlife area at Saxton that children have used extensively to study habitats. They have also

done a willow weaving workshop and made crosses that are hung from the trees to create a reflection corridor.

Children at Monk Fryston requested a pond so that they can study different habitats, and this has now been dug and a new wildlife area created. They have also planted wild flower seeds to create insect-friendly areas in the grounds.

Each Eco Warrior team is undertaking different projects. Those at Monk Fryston have worked hard

Early Years Outdoor Provision -We have been lucky enough to have had artificial grass fitted in our outdoor area. The children absolutely love it and it has given them the opportunity to learn outdoors, whatever the weather! Our outdoor learning environment now offers more physical learning space, giving the children the ability to work on their gross motor skills with a variety of physical activities. The developments in our outdoor area have allowed us to cater to all of the areas of learning and have increased the children's engagement with outdoor learning, keeping them excited and motivated.



Storytime in Year One - This summer, Year One is
exploring the wonderful world of traditional stories
and fairy tales. To inspire the children, we have
transformed our book area into a forest full of
characters complete with the giant's legs as he falls

had a porridge tasting to help us describe the

part of our Talk for Writing unit. Together, we have created a story map to then innovate in preparation for writing our own traditional tales. To link in English with the geography work, the class looked at aerial photographs of different settings, one of these being in Africa. They also read The Ghanian Goldilocks to provide us with a contrasting setting to a familiar tale. **Year 2 Pizza Making** -Year 2 have been exploring, designing and creating healthy pizzas over the past few weeks. They started with a taste test – trying a selection of breads and toppings. Whilst doing this, they identified which food groups they belonged to on the balanced food plate. Next, the children designed a pizza which was healthy, balanced and

included a range of colourful toppings. In the final week of this topic, they had the chance to make their fantastic creations. **Ledston Estate** - Year 3 and Year 5 children enjoyed their school trips to the Ledston

Estate. The wonderful team at Ledston ran a day of outdoor learning which consisted of woodland plant and animal identification, exploring food webs, applying maths to calculate the age of a living tree and scavenger hunts, finding lots of different items that were soft, round, hard and different colours as we were walking through the woods. The children relished being immersed in nature and not only topped up their understanding of the world, but grew closer together as class units.

Murton Park -Year 6 children were incredibly lucky to spend a day at



Murton Park Museum of Farming. From the moment they arrived, they were immersed into life as it would have been for a World War Two evacuee. Activities throughout the day included: packing a suitcase for an unknown length of stay, in an unknown location, with an unknown family; creating rag rugs as a team; washing clothes using a dolly, tub, washboard and mangle; learning about life as an ARP warden and putting out fires! When the air raid siren sounded, the children had to hurry for shelter and were shocked by the standards of the accommodation they found! Everybody had an amazing day.

Capital Works Update

Schools Capital Allowance funding is a vital source of funding for Schools and Trusts. It is allocated by central Government in order to help MATs with more than 5 Academies/Schools and 3000 students, maintain their buildings. These funds are allocated to the Trust to improve the condition, compliance and environment of all our schools. The STAR Multi Academy Trust received £1.7million in 2020/2021.

This year a detailed condition based capital plan of over £3million was approved by the Trust Board. This year's works include multiple projects across all our schools:

Re-roofing

Replacement windows & doors New compliant fire alarm systems New security & safeguarding

systems Boiler works Re-surfacing works Drainage improvements Disabled access Replacement floor coverings Legionella risk improvements Student toilet refurbishments



NEW BOILER

These works ensure that buildings are weather tight, safe and secure for all students and staff.

Sherburn Hungate Primary School has undergone a £2.5 million refurbishment and extension to almost double capacity and meet growing population demands. The project, which began last July, has already seen classrooms refurbished and an additional classroom created, as well as a corridor built to link to the new extension. The school's admin office has also been extended alongside refurbishment of a corridor and the front of

the school, and the hall has been refurbished to create a more flexible space which can be partitioned.

The main extension has also now been completed. The new build section includes 5 additional classrooms, new staffroom, cloakrooms and accessible toilets. Outside areas, car parking and soft landscaping has also been included in the scheme.



NEW ROOF

Transition for students and staff into the new areas will begin next week with grand opening and occupancy in September.

The Trust has also been successful in securing £200,000 in additional Government funding (Salix) to improve the lighting across our sites. This scheme has replaced older light fittings for LED fittings across 2 school sites.
